

The University of North Carolina at Greensboro 2002-2003 Profile

History/Location: The University of North Carolina at Greensboro is classified as a Doctoral/Research-Intensive University. The University was established in 1891 and became coeducational in 1963. The 200-acre campus is located 1 mile from the center of Greensboro, a city of 225,311. The Greensboro/Winston-Salem/High Point Metropolitan Statistical Area has a population of approximately 1,236,412.

Academic Schools/Programs and Degrees: Arts and Sciences; Business and Economics; Education; Health and Human Performance; Human Environmental Sciences; Music; Nursing; and Graduate School. UNCG offers over 100 undergraduate, 59 masters, and 14 doctoral programs. In 2001-02 UNCG awarded 1,826 bachelor's, 730 master's and 76 doctoral degrees. Doctoral degrees were awarded in English, Psychology, Education, Nutrition, Human Development and Family Studies, Textile Products Design and Marketing, Exercise and Sport Science, and Music.

Faculty: In 2002-03, there were 766 regular term budgeted FTE faculty positions and the student/faculty ratio was 14.5:1. 46.8% of the full-time faculty was tenured, while 83.5% held the doctorate or terminal degree in their field. Average 2002-03 AAUP Salaries were \$81,595 for Full Professors, \$59,708 for Associate Professors, and \$51,394 for Assistant Professors.

Enrollment: Fall 2002 resident headcount enrollment was 13,918 (12,317 FTE), including 10,751 (9,956 FTE) undergraduates and 3,167 (2,361 FTE) graduate students. 9,095 (85%) of undergraduate and 1,174 (37%) of graduate students were enrolled on a full-time basis. 33% of undergraduate students were male. 9% of undergraduate and 15% of graduate students were from out-of-state. 20% of undergraduate and 12% of graduate students were African-American. 36% of undergraduate students lived in residence halls. The Fall 2002 extension headcount was 535 (an additional 316 resident students took extension courses), making the total university student headcount 14,453.

Admissions/Retention: 2,099 Freshmen and 986 Transfers enrolled for the first-time in Fall 2002. 76% of freshman applicants were accepted and 39% enrolled. The average SAT score for enrolled freshmen was 1034. The middle 50% ranges for SAT scores were 460-570 for Verbal and 470-570 for Math. 74% percent of Fall 2001 Freshmen returned in Fall 2002, and 48% of freshmen graduated within six years.

Costs: Annual 2002-03 full-time tuition/fees were \$3,005 (in-state) and \$13,379 (out-of-state). Room and Board was \$4,460.

Budget: The IPEDS revenues and other additions for 2001-2002 \$211,455,474, with state appropriations (\$86,170,155) comprising 40.8%. Total expenses and deductions amounted to \$203,985,076, of which 34.0% was for instruction (\$69,254,233), 6.8% was for research (\$13,777,269) and 6.4% (\$12,981,999) was for public service.

Institutional Affiliations: UNCG is a member of the National Association of State Universities and Land Grant Colleges (NASULGC) and the American Association of Colleges and Universities (AACU). In athletics, UNCG began NCAA Division IA competition in 1991, and is a member of the Southern Conference.
